Let Me Know How Transient I Am

It was Independence Day back home, but I wasn't in the mood to celebrate. I had strained my Achilles tendon from walking all afternoon in a cheap pair of flip-flops through a maze of dusty streets in Cairo, a city of 16 million people. My translator and I were trying to locate a student who had asked us to visit her home to tell her more about Jesus. We had taken every form of transportation but a camel that day. I was tired, thirsty, overheated and just plain irritable. We finally found her apartment, but she wasn't home. When I got back to my air-conditioned room, I settled into what I hoped would be a long night's rest. And then the phone rang.

"You must come," my Egyptian friend shot back at me as I tried to politely refuse her invitation

to her rooftop party. "Your whole team is coming. We have your favorite dessert." She added a sweetness to her voice and then resorted back to her commanding tone, "You must come." To refuse would be to insult my friend and her family. So, I went, mumbling complaints about Egypt along the way. On the rooftop, I spotted my teammates and took a seat next to my friend Mike. "You're exhausted- I can tell," he said. "They forced me to come," I replied as I took the can of cold lemon Fanta he handed to me and pressed it against my face. "We won't be in Cairo much longer," he said, "You can loathe it, or you can love it." He smiled, softening the severity of his words.

It was a simple sentence, something to spur me on when I wasn't enjoying life on mission.

But those words changed my perspective. My days there were numbered. I began to sense an urgency. Instead of thinking, "I don't *have* to be here much longer," I started thinking, "I don't *get* to be here much longer." I presented my weary self to Jesus asking Him to help me make the most of my remaining time in Cairo. In the last weeks, I walked the dusty streets with joy and grew fond of the place and people.

In Psalm 39:4, David said: "Lord, make me to know my end/And what is the measure of my days;/Let me know how transient I am." It has been almost a decade since that summer in Egypt. Shortly thereafter, I met the man who would be my husband and I

made him chase me around the world for half a decade. Over two decades ago, I gave my life to Jesus. Yes, I'm getting to the age where I'm starting to think in decades. If God allows me to live a normal life-span, I'll have only five or six more of those. At first, Psalm 39:4 frightened me. David's lyrics were eerie. But then I focused on the last few words. It doesn't say I'm temporary; it says I'm transient. I am a traveler on her way Home- but I have a mission along the way.

“**Lord, make me to know my end
And what is the measure of my days;
Let me know how transient I am.**”

Northside has long been the leading church among Indiana Baptists in missions giving with over \$175,000 given to missions causes last year. Our missions funding is distributed according to the Biblical mandate in Acts 1:8 which says, "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be My witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea, and Samaria, and to the ends of the world." The Acts 1:8 strategy is to balance local missions (Jerusalem), state missions (Judea), North American missions (Samaria), and international missions (ends of the world). But an effort has been made to move Northside beyond being a great missions-giving church to becoming a great missions-going church as well.

This issue of the Vision is dedicated to Northsiders who went on mission this summer. As you read, you'll discover that the Acts 1:8 strategy is active at Northside. In local missions, we offered the first Circle City Upward Basketball Camp ministering to Indy's inner-city. Teams are helping Highland Lakes with construction projects. In North American missions, our students worked on a Native American reservation in Montana. Another Northside team worked with the Connection Church in Vancouver. College students, Erica Reed and Whitney Higgins, worked for iWitness Ministries in Texas. Jared Law took a Youth for Christ team to Mexico. With Eric David in Chile, former NSM interns Tom Hall and Lauren Higgins in Southern Africa, the Higgins family in North Africa, Cindy Timmers in Ukraine, Alison Whitely in Southeast Asia, and David Fladung in New Zealand, Northsiders were all over the globe this summer.

On August 20 at 6 pm, we will have our CommUNITY service at Main Campus. At this service, we will celebrate the return of our summer missionaries. Although he didn't know how soon he'd be going Home, our own BJ Higgins knew he was a transient when at age 14 he wrote his manifesto: "Self, I will not be satisfied. I will not watch TV or play video games. I will... visit only at Christian, beneficial websites and will only email if it is edifying to a believer.... Modern Church Gets a Little Too “Civilized”

The Barbarian Way is the latest book from forward-thinking pastor Erwin McManus. Once again, McManus has attempted to capture the Church’s imagination to be a catalyst for change in our culture.

What is the “barbarian way” and how could anything barbaric relate to modern day Christianity? That is McManus’ point exactly. He contends that something has been lost as the church has become “modern”, “domesticated” and “civilized”. The church has left its original path of risk, adventure, passion and sacrifice for something safer, less risky. Christianity has moved from a small group of renegades to a religion of conformists, traditionalists and those with a refined faith. Jesus is being obscured by a religion bearing His name. McManus believes the barbarian way is about love, intimacy, passion and sacrifice. These are to be the characteristics of the people who have met the living God and fallen in love with the Savior of their souls. As the book says, “Barbarians love to live and live to love.”

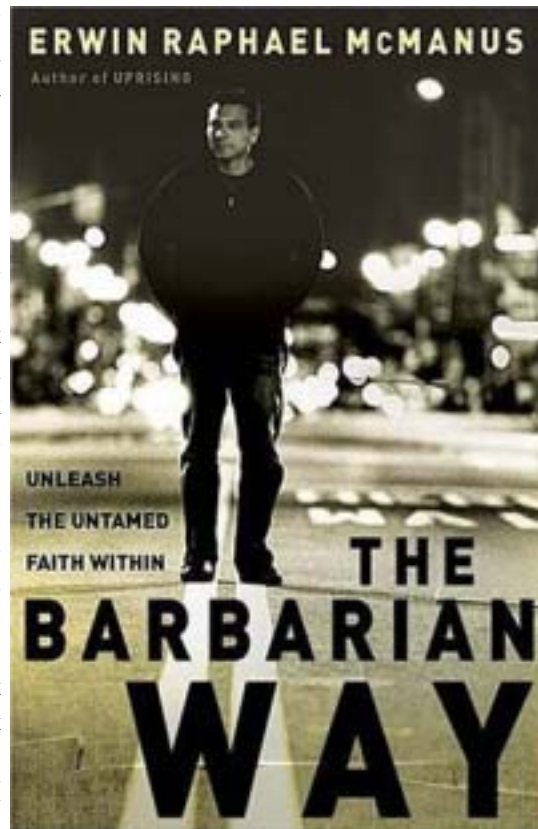
Do you heed the call of the barbarian or do you prefer something more civilized? The barbarian call is to live in this world as a citizen of an entirely different kingdom. In John 17:15-16, Jesus said to the Father: “My prayer is not that you take them out of the world but that you protect them from the evil one. They are not of the world, even as I am not of it.”

The barbarian sees the world for what it is, the kingdom of the enemy. As Christians, we are behind enemy lines and we are called to live a life that is committed to setting people free. If we live our lives in a way to not “lose” what we have in this world/life then Jesus says we will lose it. Modern Christian culture encourages us to live like the world, with only one distinct difference- we get to go to Heaven after we are done living here on earth. Many Christians think Jesus came to ensure our safety, convenience and comfort in this life. But in Luke 9:25, Jesus said, “What good is it for a man to gain the

whole world, and yet lose his own soul?” We must all ask ourselves if we have traded Jesus’ path for a more secure path in order to preserve the lives we have created for ourselves.

For an example of the barbarian lifestyle we need look no further than the Apostle Paul. Would anyone say that Paul lived a safe, comfortable or civilized faith? Paul had been a religionist with a refined life until he met Jesus. At the moment of his conversion he became a barbarian. He literally began to travel a different path. Paul did not find Jesus to be “safe” but he, like other followers of Christ, did find Him to be good, faithful, and closer than a brother. Like Paul, barbarians hear a different call and understand clearly that we follow the God who chose the way of the Cross. Jesus said for us to follow Him, wherever that may lead us. We have been called into an intimate relationship with Him in order to live a life where He has to show up. The civilized don’t need an intimate ally; the barbarian understand that their very lives depend upon Him. The civilized build shelters and invite God to stay with them; the barbarian move with God wherever He chooses to go. The civilized have a routine; the barbarian a mission. The civilized know the letter of the law; the barbarian live by the spirit of the law. For the civilized, programs make it happen; for the barbarian, the Spirit makes it happen.

What about Northside Baptist Church? Are we more civilized or barbarian? Does it really matter or is it merely an issue of personal preference? The real question that we all must answer is what did Jesus actually begin two thousand years ago? Is my life being conformed to Him or am I trying to conform Him to my lifestyle? These are deep questions that we must ponder in our hearts. As you think about your position (civilized or barbarian) pick up McManus’ book “The Barbarian Way” and let him take you deeper into your thinking about what the Christian life is meant to be.

Jesus took our punishment for us, and offers eternal life in exchange. My group consisted of about eight



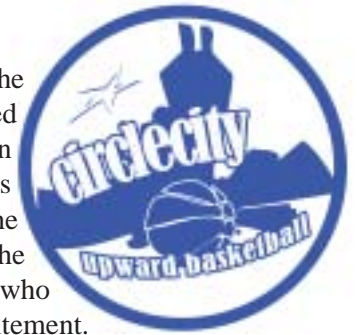

It became clear when we sang "Jesus Loves Me" and only the other leaders and I knew the words. We had 70+ well-behaved children, yet the majority knew

nothing about Jesus. They knew the name of God but had no idea what He does, who He is, nor what security He can bring to those who believe in Him. I will never forget having the opportunity to show Jesus' love and plant the first seed. At the end of the week, when several of the children called me "Coach"—I was proud to answer.

My prayer is that other older adults will answer the call to share Jesus with everyone using whatever venue God makes available— even if

it's Upward Basketball. This trip was the first of many to come in our partnership with The Connection in Maple Ridge, a suburb of Vancouver. Over the next several years, some of us will plant the seeds, others will water and God will cause the increase. I still can't make a basket or dribble down the court, but the kids started calling me "Coach" anyway. It's not about the basketball or the cheerleading; it's about telling children and their parents about Jesus.

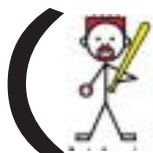

When we finished the drama, we started it over again so that the newcomers could see the whole thing. At the end we gave "the net", which explains all the symbols in the drama, then we went out to talk to the people. That night 40 people made decisions to follow Christ.

Former NSM Interns Bring Message of Hope to Southern Africa

To see the sun rise or set against the mountains, I had only to walk outside the circular house where we stayed. We were on a hill, able to overlook a village in the valley. Cows wandered along the dirt roads. Women walked the road balancing 5-gallon jugs on their heads without spilling a drop. Roosters crowed. The smell of cooking fires filled the air. This is Swaziland.

Statistics say at least 38% of the people are infected with HIV but the locals say the statistics are wrong, that at least 90% of the population is infected. The Swazi culture is so steeped in witchcraft that some of the men falsely believe they can cure themselves by having sex with a virgin. Rape is prevalent, and girls as young as 6 years old are being affected. People are dying. This is Swaziland.

The hospital was the hardest place for me to go. I knew it would be nothing like the hospital where BJ spent the end of his life, but I was still nervous. It was only my second time in a hospital since he died, and my first time in a children's ward. The first thought that struck



me as we walked the dirty hallways toward the children's wing was that BJ had everything in the medical world- up-to-date technology, current knowledge, cutting-edge procedures- and still he died. In this filthy hospital, where children came to be healed, it seemed much more likely that they would meet death.

One room was filled with premie babies wrapped in layers of blankets- no incubators. I just sobbed. As I watched through the glass into a separate section of the room, I saw a cockroach crawling on one of the

sheets. Two other rooms held almost a dozen children each. Many were gaunt. One little girl was expressionless. I could feel her spinal cord, and her ribs through her shirt as I hugged her. All I could do was pray. When I looked up and around, I saw more than half of my teammates bent over a bed, heads bowed. It was all we had to offer.

Undombi, the one who took us through the hospital wing, had more to offer. She spoke their language. In each room we entered, she told the children and their parents a Bible story and prayed over them. Every week, Undombi visits the children and brings them a message of hope. Traveler in North Africa Finds Reason for Journey

Our team had been traveling in small villages for weeks when we had the opportunity to stay in the country's largest tourist city. We were staying here because of its proximity to some of the small villages where we would be sharing our drama during the evening.

He stated there was something different about us. He could see the difference and wanted to know what it was.

When asked why he was there, he indicated that he was hitchhiking the world in search of what he was to do with his life. After viewing the drama, I sent one of our students to talk to him. He indicated that he was supposed to have been in Japan and China, but did not end up there, and was trying to figure out why he was in this area. We shared the Gospel with him, and he figured out why he was there. He gave his heart to Jesus!

After joining in 1983, Brent Higgins and his wife Deanna raised their children, Lauren, Whitney and BJ, at Northside. They served in Northside Student Ministry and sang on the church's praise team. This summer, I traveled to a closed country to play the piano for a training week for families living and serving abroad in various countries of the Pacific Rim. A group of my friends and I were asked to come to lead the music for the week. While we were there, people came from other closed countries and we were able to talk with them and hear testimonies of the work God is doing in the face of oppressive governments.



One night, a man came up to me

with a photocopied piece of music that was written in another language, completely unintelligible to me, and asked if

I would be able to accompany him the following morning while his team gave their update from the field. I told him I would do my best. The music was an operatic arrangement which, in order to play well, I would need at least a week of practice. As I began to practice and get frustrated with myself and the music, the director of the meeting approached me to thank me for taking the time to work on the song. She told me that the severity of the country

in which this man is serving is such that they are not allowed to sing out loud, and that this man and his team had not sung a song of praise to God in over three years. She said that the meeting where we were was a great encouragement to the team, in that they were able to sing aloud, and that this was going to be a special blessing to them in that this song is in their heart language.

The next morning, I listened as the man stood up and sang to God through his song, and then I played for him while he sang "How Great Thou Art," one verse in English and one verse in his language. After hearing about his team's work and listening to him sing, my pride was broken, and I had only to praise God for everything that He is, and all that He is doing abroad.

CCC Intern Leaves Summertime Behind to Help Start Ministry in New Zealand

Ukrainian Orphan Shows No Sign of Recent Cutting

Her name is Christina and she is a “cutter,” or at least she was. She used to cut herself on purpose, which experts say can result when a child has not developed healthy ways of dealing with strong emotions or difficult relational problems. Last year, the team leader's wife got Christina to promise that she wouldn't cut herself during camp. This summer we saw no evidence of fresh scars on her arms.

Christina is about 16, and is one of 90 children from an orphanage in Ukraine who is spending a month at a summer camp near the Russian border. These kids have a stigma attached to them. They are the unwanted ones. They've been given up by families who are financially, physically, mentally or emotionally unable to care for them. They've also been given up by the orphanages where they were originally placed. They are the kids we would label as emotionally-disturbed, troublemakers or slow learners.

When I was in Ukraine a few weeks ago, I didn't see troublemakers. I didn't see emotionally-disturbed kids. I didn't see children with learning disabilities. All I saw were children who were starving- but not for food or clothing or a roof over their head. They were starving for love. They were starving for affection. And they were starving for someone to share the love of Christ with them. We had the chance to do that through an organized camp program that allowed us to spend time with these kids, to build relationships with them and to pour our hearts and our lives into theirs. I'd go again in a heartbeat.

Indy's Nehemiah House Offers Chance to Reach out Right at Home

In 2003, Cornerstone Christian Fellowship saw a need to minister to women who were attending our church. Our church meets in the area used by the Metropolitan Baptist Center, in the Crossroads Association building downtown. These women were staying in the VOA, (Volunteers of America), and were part of a work release program from prison.



We felt God leading us to begin a transitional living program for women coming out of prison. In March 2004, we

bought a one-hundred year-old house, in desperate need of renovation.

In April 2005, Nehemiah House opened to our first resident. We ministered to three women that first year.

Northside members have been with us since the beginning. Some toured the house and saw it before any renovation had begun. Teams helped in the renovation process, especially with electrical and plumbing. We've had Northsiders assist with decorating, leading a Bible study, as well as on-going financial support from the church.

We currently have a need for women volunteers. Our primary hope is that

women will volunteer as house mothers, to spend the night at Nehemiah House. The basic shift is 7 pm to 7 am. The house mother's primary responsibility is to be a Christian witness to the residents of Nehemiah House. A woman can come alone or with a friend. We have a House Mother's room set-up to accommodate up to two volunteers. Other ministry opportunities include: leading a Bible study with the residents, mentoring, teaching life skills, bringing in a meal, interviewing potential residents while they're in prison, etc. For more information, contact Tom or Marla at 687-0075, or tomandmarla@sbcglobal.net.
